Southern governors conference opens

MILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — The chief executives of 16 states and Puerto Rico focused on energy and education today at the Southern Governors Association's annual conference, which opened in business. The governors' top priority was energy, including the management of nuclear waste and the future of coal, this morning. The afternoon session was devoted to education topics, among them a "report card" on Southern states' progress toward education quality.

Crews, passengers overpower oil pirates

PERKING (AP) — All 80 passengers aboard a hijacked Chinese airliner, including about 30 Americans, were reported safe today after crew members and angry passengers overpowered the five young air pirates in a fierce struggle. The official Xinhua news agency said the five hijackers were captured alive. However, foreign sources in Shanghai said some of the American passengers reported three or four of them were fatally injured in the struggle, and only one or two were breathing when the plane landed.

Mathias sees continuing obstacles to peace

WASHINGTON (AP) — Maryland Senator Charles Mathias said today even if reports that Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat has recommended Israel's right to exist are correct, many obstacles lie ahead before a lasting peace can be achieved. "There will be a very long time ahead. There are a lot of serious negotiators," Mathias said during a CBS interview Sunday.

Administration officials have confidence in Habib

WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration officials say they have complete confidence in U.S. Midwest negotiator Philip C. Habib, but a Republican senator says he should resign because of his relationship with the Reagan Group Inc. The officials say Habib is engaged in a long-term effort to bring about a business firm with extensive holdings in Arab countries, has not compromised

Controversy surfaces over Arafat's statement; artillery duels resume

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — PLO chief Yasser Arafat signed an ambiguous statement aimed at opening direct talks with the United States, but his spokesman at the United Nations today said that he represented recognition of Israel's right to exist. The daily artillery duels on the outskirts of the besieged capital resumed this morning and a Palestinian Broadcasting Organization communiqué said guerrillas repulsed an Israeli landing attempt on west Beirut's Mediterranean beach. In Tel Aviv, the Israeli military command said there was no landing attempt.

Israel warplanes raided Beirut twice Sunday, bombing the city's besieged West Bank sector for the fourth consecutive day. Before the second raid Sunday night, a Republican member of a U.S. congressional delegation, Rep. Paul McCloskey of California, showed reporters a document signed by Arafat that said: "Chairman Arafat accepts all U.N. resolutions relevant to the Palestinian question."

McCloskey said the statement applied to U.S. Security Council resolutions 242 and 338 recognizing Israel's right to exist. McCloskey said an Arafat aide had written on the back of the document a list of resolutions that presumably included 242 and 338. But when an Associated Press reporter who saw the document noted no reference to resolutions 242, McCloskey said, "No, it's not

(listed), but he (Arafat) kept saying all of them, including 242." The PLO's own observer, Zaki Turabi, said that was not true and pointed out that 242 refers to the "renegade question" of the Palestinians specifically. He told reporters in New York that Arafat's endorsement applied to U.N. General Assembly resolution 181 calling for separate Palestinian and Jewish states.

The head of PLO's mission to the U.N. office in Geneva, Daud Barakat, said the document signed by Arafat does not represent a change in the PLO's position. "Arafat has said this a hundred times, but the Americans want it on paper," he said.

The Israeli Cabinet said the McCloskey-Arafat announcement "joins a long line of announcements in the past aiming only to obtain propaganda advantages."

But Egyptian president Hosni Mubarak said it is a "very good opening for a peaceful and good solution" of the Middle East crisis. McCloskey said he believed Arafat's statement was sufficient to warrant U.S. recognition of the PLO. But the State Department said it would study the record of the Beirut meetings, and the White House recommended "extreme caution." Other U.S. officials in Washington who asked not to be identified said they didn't think Arafat met the U.S. requirement for recognition — acceptance of resolutions 242 and 338, including Israel's right to exist.

Israel, which resumed the bombing of Beirut last Thursday after a 27-day lull, is demanding that Arafat and his 4,000 guerrillas get out of Lebanon and is threatening to storm the Moslem sector of the capital if they don't go on their own.

Truck stop arguments under way

Opening arguments got under way Monday morning on the New Market truck stop question. About 30 interested citizens, mostly from the New Market area, came as spectators for the hearing held in Frederick County's new 100 million courthouse complex, which opened Monday. Peyton Paul Phillips, attorney for the concerned citizens group of New Market, started arguments to oppose the placement of a truck stop on a 6.1-acre parcel of ground near New Market. Phillips argued that there has been insufficient change to warrant placement of the truck stop in what is primarily an agricultural residential antique haven.

The case is being heard by Sixth Judicial Circuit Court Judge David L. Caron of Montgomery County. Caron Oil of Arizona seeks to build a truck stop on a 6.1-acre parcel on MD-15 just north of New Market. The proposed truck stop has been hotly contested since its initial hearing in 1981 and had received approval by the county commissioners. Approximately 350 citizens have filed a petition protesting the location. The Maryland Department of State Planning recently took a stand in opposition to the truck stop, citing the "general zoning" of New Market, which generally is referred to as the Antique Capital of Maryland.

Caron Oil contends a truck stop will serve the needs of a large segment of the community. It also includes the proposed truck stop will be in character with the neighborhood. — George Dorsey

C&P seeks revenue increase

BALTIMORE — The C&P Telephone Co. of Maryland Monday asked the Maryland Public Service Commission to approve new rates for most services and equipment that would increase company annual revenues by \$65 million.

C&P Vice President J. Henry Butts said the proposed tariffs would help offset rising costs and put the company on a stronger financial footing to order to continue serving Maryland customers. "During this period of change, C&P needs to be financially healthy so that the company can continue to attract new capital in order to provide customers with the type of phone service they have come to expect from us," Butts said. Butts pointed out that the company continues to require a tremendous amount of capital to finance its construction program — over \$250 million this year alone — to meet demands for service. The company, he added, also has instituted aggressive cost control efforts and mechanized much of its operations in order to limit expenses.

The effect of today's proposed tariff changes on individual customers depends on the services they use and the equipment they have. Under the proposed tariffs, the basic monthly rate for most products and services would rise about 27 percent. In Baltimore City, for example, flat rate service would increase from \$11.25 to \$14.33 a month; message rate service

would go from \$4.66 to \$6.83 monthly; and economy service would rise from \$5.29 to \$6.35. Business customers to the city would see a similar increase from \$7.60 to \$9.45.

Message unit charges for residential customers would rise from 6 cents to 10 cents a call, and from 10 cents to 15 cents for business customers. The flat rate for individual line service is \$9.49 and the proposed flat rate for the Maryland PSC recognized these changes and granted

Democrats shy away from tax programs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic leaders in the House are shying away from tax programs that would require voters to leave many fingerprints on election year spending cuts and tax increases, hoping Republicans will take the political jump for the legislation President Reagan wants.

Several Democratic-controlled committees in the House are continuing work this week on legislation to carry

out the mandated spending reductions and tax hikes called for in the budget blueprint Congress enacted earlier this year.

In the GOP-controlled Senate, meanwhile, Democrats are shying away from a constitutional amendment to balance the budget.

Later in the week, the Senate is expected to consider a \$12.2 billion package of spending cuts and tax increases by another \$17.5 billion.

This bill has gone to the House, where Democrats are indicating that the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee may do little more than tinker with the Senate-passed tax package to the House floor.

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., D-Mass., said the tax measure should be a "Republican bill" and it should be up to the GOP to force compliance with the Republican drafted budget resolution. In addition, some House committees already have demonstrated a reluctance to live up to the cuts mandated for them.

The House Post Office and Civil Service Committee voted almost a year ago last week to endorse only \$113 million in spending cuts over three years instead of the \$1.2 billion as mandated.

Overall, Democrats hope to force Republicans to vote on a tax at a time on several controversial cuts, but GOP leaders would prefer an overall vote, in part to shield their members from having to vote on cuts in popular programs in a campaign season.

The emerging Democratic strategy of Republican leaders during last week and predicting another series of bitter battles on the House floor to win the spending cuts the administration is seeking to keep deficit.

Predicted budget deficit rising

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government officials are predicting that the size of the budget deficit for 1983 will be larger than previously anticipated, but they don't expect the deficit to grow as fast as Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan said Sunday a revised budget report showed. Regan's prediction would be an increase of as much as \$10 billion over the \$100 billion deficit estimate. Caron said just one month ago when it adopted a new budget plan for the year beginning Oct. 1.

The treasury secretary's comments came during an interview on CBS "Face the Nation." Other officials in the administration and the Congress, however, say the prediction is based on an overly optimistic forecast of a quick end to the recession and relatively healthy economic growth later this year.

Chief White House economist Murray T. Fidenberg said last week he thought the budget forecast was a little optimistic to say the least.

Additionally, the non-partisan Congressional Budget Office, using more realistic economic forecasts, expects a deficit of \$119 billion.

When asked if the administration was being less than honest in its recent forecasts, Regan said he would be personally liable for the forecast. He said he was a little on the pessimistic side. On balance, he said, the administration honestly believes that this is the kind of recovery we will have.

The administration's forecast will predict the economy will grow at an annual rate of about 4.5 percent for the rest of the year, a pace private economists generally believe is unrealistic.

Even administration economists, speaking privately, acknowledge the
